The Downfall Of Old Russia

Late February 1917: people are dancing and singing in the palaces and opera houses of St Petersburg, whilst on the streets unrest is spreading and the cracks in public order are growing ever deeper. But the Home Secretary believes he has everything under control, so the tsar boards his glamorous imperial train and leaves the city. He will never set foot there again, for this period of history is about to become a vortex, engulfing everything it touches, signalling the end of the Tsarist Empire. Also, the alternative road which Russia could have taken leading to a different future finishes here. Jörg Baberowski captures the dynamics of this historical moment in a spectacular way. He shows how a seemingly entrenched and unshakeable order can completely collapse within a matter of days, if the individuals involved no longer know what it is based on or how to wield the power they hold.

Baberowski paints fascinating portraits, describing the events as if you were there. He shows that everything could have turned out differently if the tsar, the ministers, and the generals had understood what was going on.

This book is also a reflection on the foundations of power and the driving forces of history. Sometimes, individuals can change the course of global history within a matter of days. This was the case in Russia in February 1917, when the tsar boarded a train and revolution broke out in St Petersburg. Jörg Baberowski is a wonderful storyteller. He captures this historic moment in a unique way, bringing it to life for the reader in cinematic detail.

Jörg Baberowski is a Professor of Eastern European History at the Humboldt University in Berlin, and the author of many books and essays on Russian and Soviet history. In 2012 he won the Leipzig Book Fair Prize for his work *Verbrannte Erde. Stalins Herrschaft der Gewalt*. His books *Der Sinn der Geschichte* (2014), *Verbrannte Erde* (2022) and *Der sterbliche Gott* (2024) are also published by C.H.Beck.

1925: A Fateful Year

When Hindenburg Became President

Elections decide the fate of democracies. We are more acutely aware of this fact today than we have been for a long time. If the wrong people are elected to high office, democracies can fail. In April 1925 the German people elected Paul von Hindenburg as President of the Reich, thus creating a time bomb exploding in 1933 with devastating force. Wolfgang Niess shows how everything happened and how Hindenburg became the gravedigger of Germany's first democracy.

In February 1925, the Social Democrat Friedrich Ebert died. He had been the first President of the Reich to be appointed by the Weimar National Assembly and had led Germany through the crises of the revolution and the post-war period. Who would be his successor? In this book, the most in-depth account of the period to date, Wolfgang Niess gives us the background to the fateful election of 1925. Influential powers on the new right-wing movement wanted to use this election to drive a wedge between the bourgeois Democrats and the Social Democrats.

They were looking for another Bismarck, a man who would repress parties and parliament and dismantle democracy step by step. But the Republicans had good chances to win the election. How could they have squandered this opportunity? How did an anti-democrat manage to get himself elected to the highest office in the land? And why did so many people not realise what the new incumbent's long-term plans were? Sometimes election results do not unleash their destructive potential immediately, but only after several years.

Wolfgang Niess has a doctorate in history and was an editor with SWR Television for many years. He was a radio presenter on SWR and SDR. Niess is the author of numerous radio and television programmes, essays, and books on various aspects of contemporary history. His books *Der 9. November* (2021) and *Der Hitlerputsch 1923* (2023) are also published by C.H.Beck.

Long celebrated as a gift to humanity, electric car manufacturer Tesla now feels to many people like a threat. In this book, prizewinning investigative journalists Sönke Iwersen and Michael Verfürden pull down the Tesla's facade. Their book gives an account of a company with a toxic dependency on one man. This book on Musk reads as a warning. Musk is prepared to sacrifice anything in pursuit of his goals. And any one of us could become his next victim.

Sönke Iwersen is head of the investigative department at the Handelsblatt, Germany's biggest business newspaper. In 2011 he covered the Ergo Budapest affair and was crowned Business Journalist of the Year. He has won the Wächterpreis three times. In 2017 he was awarded the Kurt Tucholsky Prize for Literary Journalism and in 2019 he won the German Reporter Prize. Iwersen teaches at the Georg von Holtzbrinck School of Business Journalism and runs the popular podcast Handelsblatt Crime.

Michael Verfürden has been an editor in the investigative research department at the Handelsblatt since 2020. He has reported on abuses in the meat industry, dubious real estate transactions, and hackers targeting German companies. Verfürden's revelations about the scandal-hit corporation Wirecard attracted particular interest. Verfürden studied German and political science in Düsseldorf before graduating from the Georg von Holtzbrinck School of Business Journalism. He now teaches there himself, specialising in research methods in cyberspace.

Deafening Silence Downstream

A Journey From Moscow To Berlin

It is a farewell to Russia, which has become Putin's Russia, a farewell to a time when I felt happy, when large parts of Europe experienced an unprecedented period of peace, openness, and affluence. Now, something new is coming. Fasten your seatbelts. - Michael Thumann

Following on from his Spiegel Bestseller *Revanche*, Michael Thumann has written a very personal travelogue in which he reports on the new divisions in Europe as witnessed with his own eyes. In urgent reports and eyewitness accounts, he describes his journey from Moscow across the heavily guarded external borders of Russia, firstly eastwards in the direction of Central Asia and then westwards via the Baltic states and Poland into Germany: from Moscow to Berlin, right through the middle of the new Iron Curtain.

Thumann is subjected to interminable interrogations at border crossing points, visits Russian refugees in the neighbouring states, strikes up conversations with countless people with opposing views. On his way from East to West he gives stark validation to growing fears about Russia's revanchism and belligerence. He also looks back on his own family history and his shattered dreams following the end of the Soviet Union and traces the problematic relationship between Germany and Russia throughout history. Thumann's book is an impressive study of contemporary history, of the search for a security we have all lost.

Michael Thumann is a foreign affairs correspondent for Die ZEIT, and lives in Moscow. Since the 1990s he has been reporting for Die ZEIT from Russia, Eastern Europe, and the Middle East. His bestseller *Revanche. Wie Putin das bedrohlichste Regime der Welt geschaffen hat* was published by C.H.Beck in 2023. His articles, podcasts, and books about Russia as a multi-ethnic state and about Putin's new nationalism have given us a deeper insight into the country. He has been familiar with Russia since his student days when he studied at Lomonosov University in Moscow.

Iran's Shadow Army At The Gates Of Israel

In Lebanon, the 'party of God' – heavily armed by Iran – has evolved almost unnoticed into a political, social and military force fundamentally shifting the balance of power in the Middle East. Joseph Croitoru looks at how Iran has gained this foothold in the 'Axis of Resistance' since the 1980s, and why an escalation of the conflict with Israel seems inevitable. Hezbollah's goal is clearly the eradication of the Jewish state.

But unlike Hamas, the Shiite Hezbollah has been armed by Iran completely undetected which enabled the Hezbollah to drive Israel out of its positions in southern Lebanon with relative ease in 2000. Without Hezbollah, the Assad regime would not have been able to cling to power during the Syrian civil war. Joseph Croitoru, a historian, journalist and author, writes for the German-language press and radio about the conflict in the Middle East, Jewish and Islamic history, and religious fundamentalism. His book *Die Hamas. Herrschaft über Gaza, Krieg gegen Israel* (2024) is also published by C.H.Beck. In 2021 Joseph Croitoru won the Geschwister Korn und Gerstenmann-Stiftung Peace Prize.

7 October And The War In Gaza

Background, Escalation, Consequences

With Hamas's attack on Israel and Israel's war in the Gaza Strip, the conflict in the Middle East has escalated to an unprecedented level. With the benefit of hindsight, and by placing the events in their historical context, Muriel Asseburg explains what has happened since 7 October 2023, which actors are involved in the conflict. She also shows its consequences far beyond the borders of Israel and Palestine. With great empathy, Muriel Asseburg describes the terrible events we have seen since 7 October, explains their context, and shows how the ripple effect of the war is increasing all the time involving the West Bank, Syria and Iran, Lebanon and the Houthi militias in Yemen, resulting in attacks between Israel and Iran. She also looks at efforts by the USA, the Arab Contact Group and the International Court of Justice in the Hague to curb the violence. She illustrates the various perspectives in an expert manner, painting a picture of impressive depth and clarity.

Muriel Asseburg is a Middle East expert at the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP) in Berlin. Her books *Palästina und die Palästinenser. Eine Geschichte von der Nakba bis zur Gegenwart* (2023) and *Der Nahostkonflikt* (with Jan Busse, 2024) are also published by C.H.Beck.

How A Family Reunion Turned Into A Journey Through The World Of Demagogues

When Stephan Lamby learned at a family celebration that his American cousin had been involved in the storming of the Capitol, he decided to embark on an unusual journey.

Why are so many people susceptible to extreme views? Why do they succumb to the seductive power of demagogues? Over the course of a year, Stephan Lamby visited four countries to try and get a sense of what exactly radicalised citizens were afraid of. He wanted to understand why democracy is hanging in the balance. His travels took him to the USA, Argentina, Italy and Germany.

They also led him back to his own family and friends. Some encounters were very painful, others heartening. He delves deep into the history of his family and the history of the countries he knows best. A hundred years on from the emergence of historical fascism, and eighty years after its downfall, he asks whether the concept of fascism is still applicable to our current political discourse. Stephan Lamby met with people at Benito Mussolini's former residence and at Graceland, the property once owned by Elvis Presley. He observed the Argentinian president Javier Milei at close quarters, and spoke to his own American cousin, who was present at the storming of the Capitol, as well as to a doctor in Gera (Germany) who campaigns for the AfD. The conversations were almost always worthwhile. But there were also limits.

Stephan Lamby is a documentary-maker and author. For many years he has been informing people about German and international politics through his ARD documentaries, including *Nervöse Republik*, *Labyrinth der Macht* and *Im Wahn*. He has won many prizes, including the German Television Prize, the Hanns Joachim Friedrichs Prize, the Golden Camera and Journalist of the Year. His Spiegel Bestseller *Ernstfall. Regieren in Zeiten des Krieges* (2023) is also published by C.H.Beck.

The Forgotten Resistance

Jews In The Fight Against The Holocaust

The Nazis could conceive Jewish people only as passive victims. But many Jews fiercely resisted this image. However not many people are aware of the fact that 3000 Jews were active in the resistance in Germany alone. Stephan Lehnstaedt gives us a long overdue insight into this little-known aspect of history. He reminds us of an unprecedented fight against dehumanisation – a fight for dignity, culture and the right to live.

‘Hitler wants to kill all the Jews in Europe.... Let us not go like lambs to the slaughter!’ declared the student Abba Kovner in 1941. His resolute stance was shared by thousands of Jews in occupied Europe. They all rebelled against Nazi oppression, harassment and plans for their annihilation – even though their brave actions went unnoticed by the public and researchers for a long time. Now, for the first time, Stephan Lehnstaedt gives us an overview of the different forms of Jewish resistance in the Nazi state and its territories. He tells the story of people who stood up for themselves and others even in the face of death by archiving knowledge or helping people to flee, or through acts of sabotage, uprisings, or armed resistance. This is a long-overdue reminder of a forgotten war which was not only, but primarily, about sheer survival.

Stephan Lehnstaedt is a Professor of Holocaust and Jewish Studies at the Touro University in Berlin. He regularly gives talks on television and on the radio, and writes for the *Süddeutsche Zeitung*, the *Tagesspiegel* and the *Jüdische Allgemeine*, among others. His books *Der vergessene Sieg* (2022) and *Der Kern des Holocaust* (2023) are also published by C.H.Beck.

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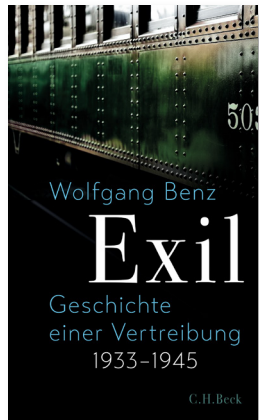

Exile

History Of A Displacement 1933 - 1945

Crammed onto a ship, Jewish refugees hope for asylum in Israel. As a famous writer, Thomas Mann enjoys a certain level of privilege in the USA, but even he finds it hard to get used to a life in exile. Marianne Cohn does not make it out alive. She is raped and shot while attempting to flee to Switzerland. Exile during the Nazi era consists of countless histories taking us to every corner of the world.

The Third Reich forced hundreds of thousands of people to leave Germany. Jews feared for their lives, as did other German citizens who had been active against the Nazis or did not agree with their world view. In his seminal study, with close references to the sources, Wolfgang Benz gives a powerful account of this massive, forced migration. He traces in meticulous detail the stages and locations of exile, the often-humiliating ways in which people managed to obtain visas, and the difficult living conditions they experienced in other countries as (often unwelcome) foreigners. He gives a voice to 'celebrities' like Hannah Arendt, Sigmund Freud and Thomas Mann, but also to people who usually do not receive much attention. The fate of an unknown Jewish child welfare worker is given the same weight as the story of the world-famous inventor of relativity theory.

Wolfgang Benz is one of Germany's most renowned contemporary historians. Until 2010 he worked as a professor at the University of Berlin, where he was head of the Centre for Antisemitism Research. He has published many works with C.H.Beck, including most recently *Im Widerstand* (2019) and *Allein gegen Hitler* (2024).

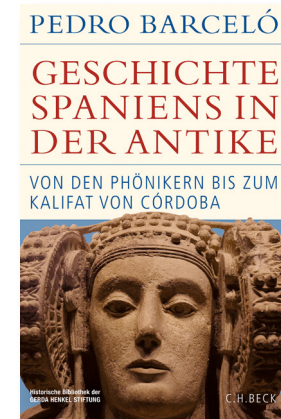
From The Phoenicians To The Caliphate Of Córdoba

He is a corresponding member of the Real Academia de la Historia in Madrid and has written important monographs on subjects including Hannibal, Carthage, Alexander the Great and the Roman Empire in late antiquity.

Wisdom is a multifaceted concept which we all see as something particularly valuable, we appreciate wise people and wise decisions, but at the same time wisdom barely plays a role in our lives. In his new book, Otfried Höffe brings us closer to the noble art of wisdom. He shows us that it is not an unattainable idea but the marker of a good life, and one which we need to rediscover.

Höffe takes us on a philosophical journey to discover different forms of wisdom showing us how it can provide us with a strong sense of direction in life, encompassing all areas of our existence. Above all, this book is about applying wisdom to life. Otfried Höffe is an Emeritus Professor of Philosophy and head of the Political Philosophy Research Unit at the University of Tübingen, and Professor of Practical Philosophy at Tsinghua University in Beijing. He works mainly on ethics and political philosophy, as well as Kant and Aristotle. He has published many books with C.H.Beck, including: *Die hohe Kunst des Verzichts* (2023), *Die hohe Kunst des Alterns* (2019), *Immanuel Kant* (2020), *Kants Kritik der reinen Vernunft* (2004, in paperback 2023) and *Kleine Geschichte der Philosophie* (2022). 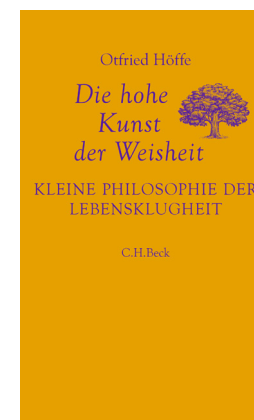

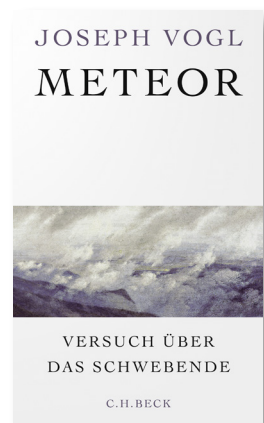

Meteor

An Exploration Of Suspended Things

In the beginning there was a glance at the sky. In ancient Greek, the word 'meteor' referred to a large and diverse collection of floating objects, including atmospheric phenomena like clouds and the weather, but also the paths and movements of the stars. Volatile and unfixed phenomena are not only found in the field of meteorology, however. In his brilliant essay, Joseph Vogl explores various contexts – from literature to philosophy to natural sciences – where suspended and ephemeral things are found, where things become light (again), where the weight of the world disappears and opens new spaces of possibility.

Suspended things are a challenge to our processes of perception because they exist in the space of 'no longer and not yet' and thus evade common forms of knowledge and concept formation, and notions of order. Using the example of famous texts – by Kafka and Musil, Goethe and Galilei, Italo Svevo and Jorge Luis Borges – Joseph Vogl, one of the most extraordinary philosophers of our times, explores the relationships of heaviness and lightness. In an era increasingly affected by the gravitational forces of economic, ideological and military powers, Vogl's text, based on his very well-received farewell lecture in Berlin, is a homage to moments of fluidity in which the freshness of a new beginning can burst forth even from seemingly ossified situations.

Joseph Vogl was a Professor of Modern German Literature at the Humboldt University in Berlin until 2023, and is a Permanent Visiting Professor at Princeton University. In 2022 he won the Günter Anders Prize for Critical Thinking. His book *Kapital und Ressentiment. Eine kurze Theorie der Gegenwart* (2021) is also published by C.H.Beck.

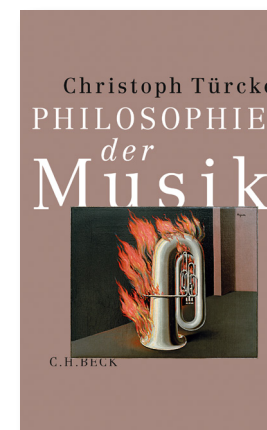

The Philosophy Of Music

A book resembling a great opera in five acts with an overture at the beginning and numerous intermezzi. Christoph Türcke sheds new light on the mystery of music, tracing it back to the beginning of human history. His expertly written book also takes the reader on an exemplary tour through the history of music, from bone flutes and dithyrambic choruses to medieval chorales and Viennese Classicism, from Wagner and Mahler to twelve-tone music, jazz and rap. Even the most recent contemporary music can only be understood by looking at its earliest beginnings.

What is that strange, penetrating and yet timid thing that enters through our ears and goes deep inside, which rings out and fades away again in an instant, which shocks us, moves us, cheers us, shapes us – yet which we cannot hold onto? This question is at the heart of the philosophy of music. To answer it, Christoph Türcke delves deep into numerous aspects of philosophy and history. He introduces us to the soundscapes of bioacoustics and the holistic ‘hmmm’ of the hominids. In the context of ecstatic choral singing, he conjures up the piercing tone of the bone flute. The musical orgy of Wagner’s *Venusberg Music* features in the book, as does Schönberg’s attempt to compose music entirely free from dissonance. And finally, the ‘philosophy of music’ kindles the fire of jazz and evokes the here and now of hip-hop.

Christoph Türcke used to teach philosophy at the Academy of Visual Arts in Leipzig. At just seventeen he strained his left hand while practising a violin concerto, forcing him to give up on a career as a violinist. His books *Philosophie des Traums* (2011) and *Mehr! Philosophie des Geldes* (2015) are also published by C.H.Beck.

The Dark Side Of Language

How Words Exclude, Demean And Manipulate

Our language has a dark side: it gives us the tools to understand each other and open our world, but those same tools also enable us to discriminate against others ('asylum seekers are criminals'), to communicatively disempower others (mansplaining), to disparage others or simply to talk bullshit.

Tim Henning, Nikola Kompa and Christian Nimtzt embark on a philosophical investigation into the dark side of our language. They show us linguistic forms of exclusion and concealment which are so powerful thanks to hidden mechanisms driving our communication we are not aware of. How do they look like, and how do they enable us to permanently stigmatise people, openly lie, or smuggle highly problematic underlying assumptions into our conversation? And how can we prevent them? A critical philosophical perspective is urgently needed here, to rob them of their power and to take the emotion out of the heated debates about our use of language.

Tim Henning is a Professor of Practical Philosophy at the University of Mainz and specialises in ethics.

Nikola Kompa and **Christian Nimtzt** are Professors of Theoretical Philosophy - Nikola Kompa at the University of Osnabrück, and Christian Nimtzt at the University of Bielefeld.

An Introduction To Modern Philosophy

Axel Hutter shows, in an accessible and original way, that the 'metaphysical' is illustrating how language and metaphysics are self-evident facts, existing right there in front of our eyes. But it is precisely because they seem so self-evident (and thus remain hidden) that philosophy is necessary.

Axel Hutter's book is an unusually accessible and exciting introduction to modern philosophy. It begins with the so-called linguistic analytic turn associated mainly with Frege and Wittgenstein. 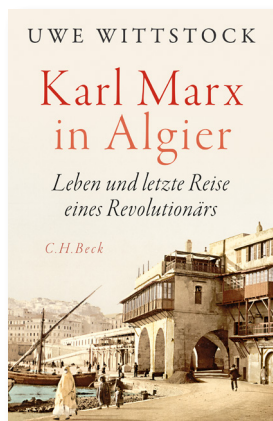

Karl Marx in Algiers

On 18 February 1882, Karl Marx boards the steamship Said in Marseille and leaves Europe for the first time. He is grieving the death of his wife Jenny three months earlier. He is ill hoping a period of convalescence in Algiers will help him recover. As he absorbs the impressions of this new culture, he draws up an unsentimental résumé of his life and work. Uwe Wittstock gives a lively account of the great thinker's last major journey and joins him in looking back on his extraordinary life.

At the port of Algiers, Karl Marx is welcomed by a former Paris Commune fighter. But the days of Marx's involvement in political struggles are over. In leaving Europe he has also left behind his past ideological battlefields, for his doctor has told him to avoid all intellectual exertion. What is left to him but to indulge in reminiscences? Drawing on extensive source material, some of it previously unpublished, Uwe Wittstock describes Marx's months in Algiers and examines the life of a thinker who divides opinion like hardly any other. Some people put him on a pedestal, whilst others are quick to condemn him. We learn about Marx's wild student days in Bonn and Berlin, about his early poetic ambitions, about his unexpected role in the revolution of 1848 (where surprisingly, he acted as a brake), and about his permanent exile and the privations of poverty he suffered. Why did Marx remain politically isolated almost all his life, and why did he leave his magnum opus, 'Das Kapital', unfinished? Towards the end of his time in Algiers, Marx goes to the barber and gets his revolutionary's beard cut off: a late withdrawal, perhaps?

Uwe Wittstock is a writer and journalist, and until 2018 was the editor of *Focus*. He has previously worked as a literary editor for the FAZ, an editor at S. Fischer, and a culture correspondent and deputy head of the features section for Die Welt. He has been awarded the Theodor Wolff Prize for Journalism. His books *Februar 33. Der Winter der Literatur* (2021; paperback 2024) and *Marseille 1940. Die große Flucht der Literatur* (2024) are also published by C.H.Beck.

Rilke

Poet Of Fear

A Biography

Rainer Maria Rilke is widely regarded as one of the greatest poets of the 20th century. His art consisted in 'making things out of fear', as he wrote in July 1903 to his former lover Lou Andreas-Salomé. In his new biography, which looks at Rilke's life and his work in equal measure, Manfred Koch depicts Rilke as a highly sensitive depth sounder and the most gender-fluid poet of the emerging modern age. He gives us a fascinating account of a radical life, depicting Rilke as a man who wanted to literally embody art. He developed a sensibility and perceptiveness bringing him into alarming proximity with the abysses in himself and his era.

The stages in Rainer Maria Rilke's life are also landmarks in his work: Prague, Russia, Worpswede, Paris, Munich, Duino, Spain, Switzerland. Manfred Koch's brilliantly written biography portrays these stages as stations on a creative Way of the Cross, undertaken by a man who was both physically and mentally fragile, and combines an examination of Rilke's life with exemplary, accessible interpretations of his work. The writer of the *Duino Elegies* emerges as an expert scrounger, a man who cast his spell over women and artistic patrons alike, and who was pretentious to the point of being unbearable, but who did all of this – living his whole life, in fact – in service of the one thing that truly mattered to him: creating poetry for the ages, and turning life into 'true' art. He succeeded, but the price was high – for him and for everyone close to him.

Manfred Koch was born in Stuttgart in 1955. Until 2021 he taught German literary history at the University of Gießen, Tübingen and Basel. Together with the writer Angelika Overath, he runs a creative writing school in Sent in the Engadine, where he now lives.

Volker Reinhardt is an Emeritus Professor of History at the University of Fribourg. Kulturgeschichte Italiens* (2022) and biographies of de Sade, Voltaire, Montaigne and most recently Giordano Bruno (*Der nach den Sternen griff*, 2024). Even in ancient times, the Huns were seen as the epitome of warlike barbarians. On their horses they swept through villages and towns like storms, sowing horror and dread. Mischa Meier is a Professor of Ancient History at the University of Tübingen. He is an internationally renowned expert on the transition period between late antiquity and the early Middle Ages. 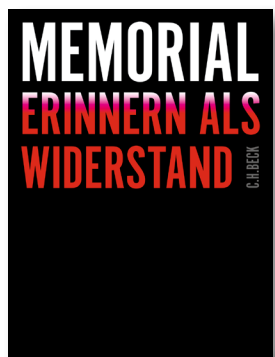

Memorial – Remembering As Resistance

In October 2022, the human rights organisation Memorial was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. That same day, an order was issued for the closure of the organisation's office in Moscow. Following the raid, the letter 'Z' could be seen all over its materials and furniture, a memento. The Memorial network became world-famous thanks to its unparalleled educational work, but for Moscow it represented only one thing: a disruptive element which had to be eliminated. This was not the first attack on the memory of the nation which the organisation had experienced and successfully fended off. Here the organisation presents a chronicle of its struggles.

Memorial is the unsilenced voice of the critical public in Russia. For 30 years the NGO has been fighting for a historical reappraisal of totalitarian rule in the former Soviet Union and for an improvement to the current human rights situation in Russia. After the network was labelled a 'foreign agent organisation' and officially dissolved, its members continued their courageous fight in exile. But how can they carry on and what will remembering look like in the future? To answer this question, the present initiative has brought together a team of over a dozen experts from the fields of historical research, journalism and literature. Together, contributors including Oleg Orlov, Aleida Assmann, Anne Applebaum, Karl Schlögel, Gerd Koenen, Nobel Prize for Literature laureate Herta Müller and Swetlana Alexijewitsch remember the actions and successes of the brave dissidents. The conflict over Russia's critical memory continues – despite, or perhaps because of, the widely acknowledged fact that the first victim of war is truth.

Irina Scherbakowa is a Russian cultural scholar and Germanist. As a founding member of Memorial, she shaped the organisation's work for over 30 years. She now lives in exile in Tel Aviv and Berlin, from where she presides over the project *Future Memorial*. The book was written in collaboration with her colleague Elena Zhemkova, also a co-founder of Memorial and director of *Memorial International*, as well as the exiled journalist Filipp Dzyadko.

Henkel

From Washing Powder Manufacturer To Global Corporation

Persil, Ata, Pril, Somat, Pritt – many of the brands part of the multinational corporation Henkel have been a permanent fixture in the daily lives of many Germans for decades. But few are aware of the multilayered, turbulent history behind the Henkel name. For the first time, this comprehensive, well-researched account by Joachim Scholtyseck traces the history of an essential company to Germany from 1876 to the present day. He shows how Henkel went from being a washing powder manufacturer to a global corporation, and now a global leader in the adhesives market.

Henkel was a child of the early German Empire and benefited from the economic boom in the young German nation state. The population's improved standard of living led to increased demand for everyday consumer goods, and the company rapidly stepped up its production of washing powder to meet this increasing demand. Founded in Aachen by Fritz Henkel, it quickly expanded and in 1900 moved its headquarters to Düsseldorf, where it is still based today. In 1907 the revolutionary detergent Persil came to market. It was advertised innovatively and heralded a quantum leap for the company. It is probably still the most famous brand to be associated with Henkel. But even in the early 20th century, Persil represented only a fraction of the product range of this extremely versatile company. Joachim Scholtyseck looks at the sources of Henkel's success and analyses the elements which turned this Aachen start-up into a flourishing company. He explores the firm's role in the Third Reich and shows how a washing powder manufacturer became a global corporation.

Joachim Scholtyseck is a Professor of Modern and Contemporary History at the University of Bonn. His books *Der Aufstieg der Quandts* (2011), *Die Geschichte der DZ BANK* (with Timothy Guinnane, among others, 2013), *Freudenberg* (2016), *Merck* (2018), *Der Bank- und Börsenplatz Essen* (2018) and *Die National-Bank* (2021) are also published by C.H.Beck.

Entwined Nations

The Paradoxical Mechanics Of European Integration

This book provides a systematic guide to the functional areas of the EU and investigates the patterns of its decision-making processes using examples from the legal, political and cultural spheres. It sheds light on the internal tensions of European integration and focusses on their cross-problematic regularities: a limited transfer of power to the Union level is followed by its delimitation. This in turn results in strong ambivalences on the part of the states and their citizens towards integration.

These ambivalences can only be managed, but not eliminated. What advances Europeanization leads to conflicts with the national self-assertion of many individual states. In this situation, the global political upheaval is increasingly forcing Europe to adapt to the changed situation. This astute assessment of the current state of European integration also addresses whether and how the European Union can succeed in countering the outbreak of atavistic political violence and stemming the rise of populist forces in the member states.

Ulrich Haltern is a Professor of Public Law, European Law and Legal Philosophy at the University of Munich. He is the author of the multivolume standard work *Europarecht* (2017) and the study *Obama's politischer Körper* (2009), among others.

The Western Modern Era In Times Of Global Crisis

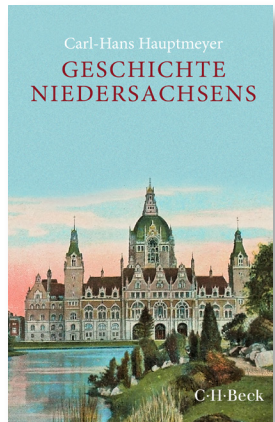
Where does the unease in modern culture come from? Why are more and more people seeking alternatives to our current political and economic system? Detlef Pollack shows how the modern era is being driven mad by its own promises of freedom, affluence, and peace, especially because wars and crises lead to loss, rage, and disappointment. His book is an impassioned plea to hold fast to the modern era and its expectations despite everything.

After 1789, the educated wondered whether the French Revolution, which they had initially celebrated, had really brought freedom, or rather terror, despotism, and alienation. But soon people realised that 'the species could not have made progress in any other way' (Schiller). In his brief theory of the modern era, Detlef Pollack shows in a nutshell that the ability to self-correction and self-criticism has been inherent in modernity from the very beginning. The major crises of the present day as new military threats, the climate crisis, migration flows and right-wing populism are undermining people's faith in freedom and democracy. The longing for a new, old simplicity is strong. We must resist it. Because the modern era, as this illuminating book shows, has by no means reached the limits of its capacity for self-correction.

Detlef Pollack, a sociologist of religion, is a senior professor at the *Religion and Politics* excellence cluster at the University of Munster. He is known to a wide audience through his publications on religion in modern society and, according to Die ZEIT, is 'one of the most renowned scholars of religion in Germany'.

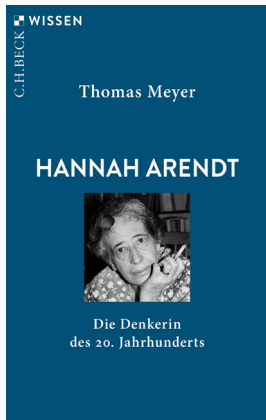
The History Of Lower Saxony

This book, written by an established expert on regional history, paints a lively portrait of present-day Lower Saxony and its historical roots. An informative introduction to the state's history, from its origins in the Middle Ages to the present day.

The regional diversity of Lower Saxony is based on historical developments going all the way back to the Middle Ages and the Early Modern Period. Even then, there were several important connecting routes between the big cities of Europe running through Lower Saxony. Hannah Arendt

The Thinker Of The 20th Century

Why is Hannah Arendt currently our most cited philosopher and political theorist? In her life and in her work, Arendt always wanted to be ‘completely contemporary’, and confronted her own era with its dramatic upheavals and abysses. In this book, historian of ideas and Arendt biographer Thomas Meyer traces the stages of the philosopher’s life, from Königsberg to Paris and New York, and relates them closely to her work. He gives us a concise introduction to her most important works and presents them as commentaries on contemporary history. It is this contemporaneity that makes Hannah Arendt so attractive to us in the 21st century.

Thomas Meyer is a postdoctoral philosophy researcher and, having held posts both in Germany and abroad, now teaches philosophy at the University of Munich. His research focuses on the 20th century. In 2023, Piper published his acclaimed biography of Hannah Arendt (which reached Number 1 on Die Zeit/ZDF/DLF’s list of the best non-fiction books).

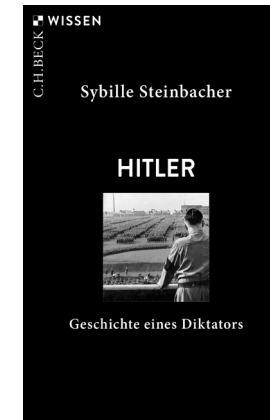

History Of A Dictator

The rise and appeal of Hitler are a mystery to this day – and the more he is demonised, the more of a mystery they become. Sybille Steinbacher looks at Hitler's background, the roots of his antisemitism, and how he went from being an orator and putschist to a beacon of hope for many people and, ultimately, Chancellor of Germany. She explains how Hitler established his power founded on racism within just a few years, and how, with the Second World War and the Holocaust, he brought about a historically unique catastrophe. In an epilogue, she looks at perceptions of Hitler after 1945. A compact introduction for anyone in search of a concise and reliable source of information about the dictator.

Sybille Steinbacher is a director of the Fritz Bauer Institute and Professor of Research into the History and Impact of the Holocaust at the University of Frankfurt am Main. Her book *Auschwitz. Geschichte und Nachgeschichte* (2020) is published in the same series (C.H.Beck Wissen) and has been translated into various languages.



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Jakob Kraus

A History Of The Middle East

From The Colonial Era To The Present Day

The Middle East is close to Europe geographically but also historically and culturally. Jakob Kraus explores the history of the region between Morocco and Iraq from around 1800, when more and more areas were falling under European control, to the present day. He looks at early reform movements, the development of infrastructure (such as the building of the Suez Canal), different forms of colonial rule, and the era of nation states. This compact introduction makes vividly clear why peace still eludes the Middle East in the 21st century, with the War on Terror, the Arab Spring, the civil wars and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Jakob Kraus is a Professor of the Modern and Contemporary Cultural History of North Africa at the University of the Armed Forces in Munich.

History, Constitution, Politics

The 'Vatican City State' is the smallest state in the world, and yet it has all the elements of a sovereign political system: a constitution, citizens, territory, an army, a currency and diplomatic agencies. The head of state is the Pope, who is also 'head of the universal church'.

Jörg Ernesti gives a vivid account of how the microstate was founded, with Mussolini's blessing, in 1929, following the downfall of the once-powerful medieval papal state; he looks at how the Vatican's constitution and government work and how political power, religious charisma, art and history come together to form a unique and fascinating blend.

Jörg Ernesti is a Professor of Medieval and Modern Ecclesiastical History at the University of Augsburg.

The Cistercians

The First Christian Order

The Cistercians are known largely for their monasteries and ruined abbeys, situated in picturesque, wooded valleys, which radiate clarity and concentration to this day. Ulrich Köpf gives a vivid account of how the first Christian order arose from the founding of a new monastery in Cîteaux (Burgundy) and the founding of daughter houses. Bernard of Clairvaux was instrumental in shaping this order. After an early heyday in the 12th century, the economic success enjoyed by the monasteries led to rule-breaking, which was always followed by reminders of the original Cistercian ideals of silence, poverty and simplicity, even and especially in unsettled times.

Ulrich Köpf is an Emeritus Professor of Ecclesiastical History at the University of Tübingen. He is one of Germany's most distinguished experts on the history and theology of the Cistercians.

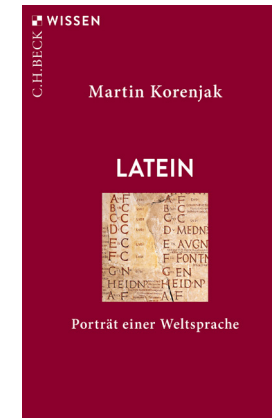

From Rearmament To The New Era

In the summer of 1955, the Bundeswehr (the German Armed Forces) was founded, just ten years after the end of the Second World War. It has never been uncontroversial, and to this day the Germans have never entirely warmed to their army. During the Cold War, the Bundeswehr formed the core of NATO's land forces in Europe. But after 1990 its headcount, equipment and capabilities were steadily downgraded, and eventually military service was also abolished. The Bundeswehr's focus changed from territorial defence to foreign deployments. But since 24 February 2022, everything has been different. Now, the army needs to regain its former capabilities in record time. And the population must examine their own attitudes towards the Bundeswehr and the possibility that it may have to be deployed. Sönke Neitzel tells the story of the Bundeswehr, introduces the reader to its structures, and analyses the problems posed by the new era in which we now find ourselves.

Sönke Neitzel is a Professor of Military History/the Cultural History of Violence at the University of Potsdam and is one of Germany's leading experts on the subject of the military and military history – he is highly sought-after by the press, radio and television.

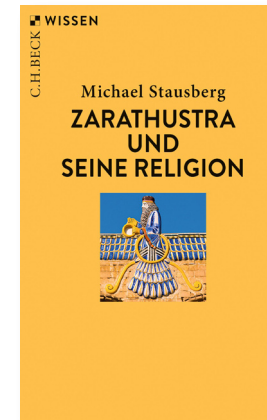

In this book, Rabea Edel tells the moving story of her mother's life and paints a portrait of an entire postwar generation growing up in the shadow of violence and under a veil of silence. This is a novel about the power of love and about people reclaiming their own history through language.

Raisa lives alone with her mother Martha and has always done. She has no memory of her father. Her name is the only thing she got from him – that's for the best, says Martha. But then Raisa starts asking questions. When the neighbour boy Mat disappears, Martha finally starts talking: About her grandmother Dina. About lies that protect and lies that endanger. About the love of her life, and about her greatest loss.

A fateful night during the last days of the Second World War links Martha's family with Jacob, a local Jewish child who always has to disappear behind new identities in order to survive.

This is a novel about family which spans the 1920s, the American occupation in Bremerhaven, a 1980s childhood in the Federal Republic of Germany, and present-day New York. A book that is like a kaleidoscope, focusing mainly on women – and on women's ability to constantly reinvent themselves.

Rabea Edel was born in Bremerhaven in 1982, and lives by the Moselle river and in Berlin. She was an Open Mike Prize winner and has been awarded grants by the Jürgen Ponto Foundation and the Academy of the Arts. Her debut novel, *Das Wasser, in dem wir schlafen*, was critically acclaimed and won several prizes, including the Kunstpreis Literatur Berlin-Brandenburg and the Nicolas Born Förderpreis. Her second novel, *Ein dunkler Moment*, was equally well received. In 2021 she published the art book *A Second Beating Heart* and exhibited her own photography. Her radio play *Ihre Geister Sehen* (Deutschlandfunk Kultur), featuring the actor Sandra Hüller, won the ARD Radio Play Prize.

Suspended Loads

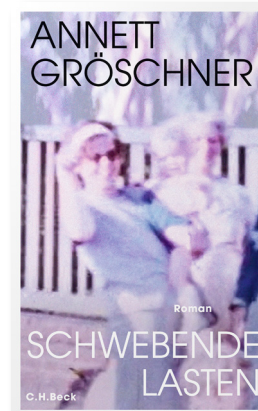
A Novel

Annett Gröschner tells nothing less than the story of an entire life – that of florist and crane operator Hanna Krause. And she goes even further that that – she transforms a life into literature, with the kind of power and poetry only found in writing that is vivid, realist, bursting with life.

Hanna Krause was a florist before life made her a crane operator. She lived through two revolutions, two dictatorships, an uprising, two world wars ending in two defeats, two democracies, and the leadership of the Kaiser and many others; she experienced good times and bad times; she gave birth to six children and was unable to bury two of them, which pained her until the end of her life. Later, long after she had bid goodbye to her florist's shop, she worked as a crane operator in the hall of a state-owned heavy machinery plant in Magdeburg where she had an excellent view of the relationships of the people ten metres below her. She died before she got to the point where she no longer understood the world. Right up until her death, Hanna Krause was a woman who took life as it came. Her only credo: stay decent. Annett Gröschner's 'Suspended Loads' is an outstanding novel about the end of the industrial age and its protagonists in East Germany. It is the story of a century – a story which helps us understand how our mothers and grandmothers came to be the women they were for us. And it is a story of women in production and reproduction, and of a tender little plant in the factory yard called Hope.

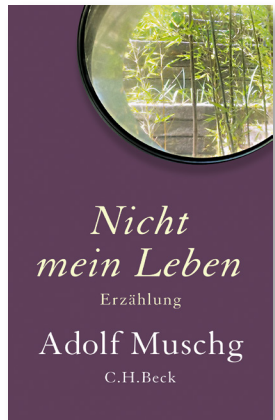
Annett Gröschner was born in Magdeburg in 1964 and has lived in Berlin since 1983. Since 1997 she has been working as an interdisciplinary writer, journalist, lecturer and performer. She is best known for her novels *Moskauer Eis* (2000) and *Walpurgistag* (2011). Her bestseller *Drei ostdeutsche Frauen betrinken sich und gründen den idealen Staat*, written with Peggy Mädler and Wenke Seemann, was published by Hanser in 2024.

Adolf Muschg

Not My Life

Stories

Not My Life is a dense, moving story about truth and lies, and about the life and loves of August Mormann. It is perhaps Adolf Muschg's most personal literary text, and his legacy.

August Mormann, eighty years old, an increasingly fragile former grammar school teacher of ancient languages, and the author of passionate essays about Europe, is looking into a burial plot for himself in a Zurich cemetery. His much younger third wife Akiko Kanda, who is from Japan, wants to be buried with him one day. It is a moving proof of love in a complicated marriage. This, and the discovery that the adjoining grave is occupied by his former classmate Robin, who helped August when he was an orphaned boy abandoned by his half-siblings, and to whom he owes his spiritual survival, leads Mormann to re-evaluate his life and the rules by which he has lived it. When he returns from Trieste, where he had been attending a conference on Europe that was overshadowed by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, he finds that his wife has disappeared. Mormann redoubles his efforts to find out more about his former classmate and to learn more about himself. But Robin, and his wife Aki, will only ever appear to him as epiphanies from now on.

Adolf Muschg used to be a Professor of German Language and Literature at the ETH in Zurich and President of the Berlin Academy of the Arts. His large body of work has won numerous prizes, including the Hermann Hesse Prize, the Georg Büchner Prize, the Grimmshausen Prize and most recently the Swiss *Grand Prix de Littérature*.

Of Sheep And Wolves

Thriller

Highly topical, fast-paced and full of acerbic wit, political thriller 'Of Sheep and Wolves' is about the machinery of power surrounding the US election, and its impact on a news desk in Munich.

Never has the *Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung* been in possession of such explosive material: the newspaper has acquired the secret medical records of the former president, which suggest that the man who was once the most powerful individual in the world is suffering from a potentially deadly genetic disorder. This is sensational news, given that Adam Rycart says he intends to stand for re-election. But making an enemy of the former president is not without its dangers. Achim Zons studied law, politics, history and philosophy in Heidelberg and Munich. After graduating and doing a doctorate, he stayed on at the university as a lecturer and went on to write for the *Süddeutsche Zeitung* as an editor for over 30 years. He now works as a screenwriter and lives in Munich.

Grete Weil

The Road To The Border

A Novel

Edited by Ingvild Richardsen

The Road to the Border is Grete Weil's great novel about everyday life and resistance in the Nazi era. Written while the author was in hiding in Amsterdam in 1944, this moving book deals with a young woman's flight from Germany in 1936 and a great love affair which ends in tragedy.

The 'awkwardness of the beginning' poses a Herculean task for philosophy: how can a truly philosophical realisation be arrived at? How has this problem of the systematic starting point been solved in the history of philosophy? Referring to Hegel, Vieweg draws a logical map of all kinds of philosophical opening moves, in which the intellectual fascination of philosophising becomes tangible.

Weil tells the story of a young Jewish girl from Munich, Monika Merton, whose husband has already been killed in the concentration camp Dachau. Monika is now wanted by the Gestapo herself, so she sets out to cross the border into Austria, covering the last leg of the journey on foot and on skis. She is accompanied by a young acquaintance, the poet Andreas von Cornides, and she tells him her story: scenes from her life in Munich and the turbulent, fast-paced, frenzied Berlin of the early 1930s, her love for her cousin Klaus, her marriage, her travels, the various crises in her life, and her work at an alternative rural school in Bavaria – until Hitler came to power. 'The Road to the Border' is an important work of German literature, impressive and moving, wise and clear-sighted.

Grete Weil (1906-1999) studied German in Munich and then did an apprenticeship as a photographer. In 1935 she followed her husband Edgar Weil into exile in Amsterdam. After the war she lived in West Germany, and her literary work, which won numerous prizes, was devoted mainly to remembering the persecution and annihilation of European Jews.

Ingvild Richardsen is a literary and cultural scholar whose research focuses on the women's movements and forgotten women authors of the 19th and 20th centuries, on Jewish heritage, and on the Nazi era. She teaches and researches at the University of Augsburg.

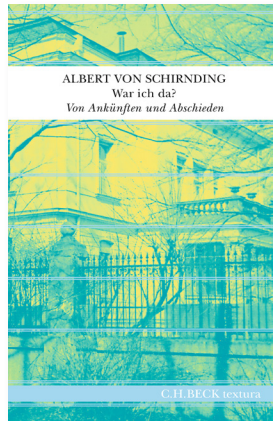


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Albert von Schirnding

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Of Arrivals And Farewells

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The challenge of existence is to take the randomness of one's own finite time on earth and turn it into the unique thing that every human life has the potential to be. That is why the title of this book, 'Did I Exist?', asks to what extent the 'I' in this case managed to rise to the challenge of existing. It is impossible, however, to be fully present in every situation and under all circumstances. Arrivals and farewells are inevitable; some happen by choice, but many are unwelcome. In his autobiographical account, Albert von Schirnding looks back at the key times and places in his life, because he finds these to be the most useful illustrative material in answering the question of how to live a successful life. His reflections span almost a whole century, from the Regensburg of his childhood with its old-world nobility to the rural parallel universe where he spent the majority of his life. His book is a thoughtful, sometimes amused, and deeply wise meditation on life.

Albert von Schirnding is a poet, storyteller, essayist and literary critic. He is a member of the Bavarian Academy of Fine Arts and the Academy of Sciences and Literature in Munich. His books *Die 101 wichtigsten Fragen: Thomas Mann* (2008), *Galerie der guten Geister. Von Sappho bis Beckett* (2020) and *Alter Mann, was nun? Gedankengänge auf späten Wegen* (2024) are also published by C.H.Beck.

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Dirk von Petersdorff is a Professor of Modern German Literature at the University of Jena and a leading expert on German-language poetry. He is also a writer and poet, and has won the Kleist Prize (among others). His acclaimed new edition of *Der ewige Brunnen* was published by C.H.Beck in 2023. He is the author of *Geschichte der deutschen Lyrik*, published by C.H.Beck Wissen, and editor of C.H.Beck's poetry calendar.



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
