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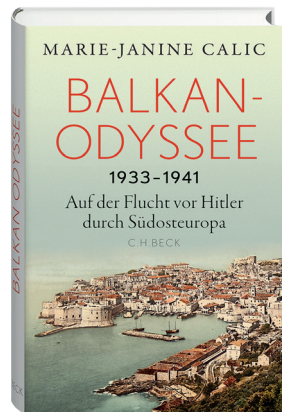

Balkan Odyssey

1933-1941 Fleeing Hitler through Southeast Europe

Refuge in the Balkans – the forgotten exile

Theater star Tilla Durieux, writers Manès Sperber and Ernst Toller, playwright Franz Theodor Csokor, painter Richard Ziegler, and many others fled Hitler to southeastern Europe, where they found refuge. Today, however, this first Balkan route has been all but forgotten. Marie-Janine Calic recalls them and tells moving stories of courage and humanity, of misery and betrayal, of rescue and doom. When Hitler came to power, the Balkans were 'somewhere down there' for many persecuted and threatened people. Nevertheless, they fled not only to the democratic West and the communist Soviet Union, but also to the supposedly backward southeast of Europe, with at least 55,000 going to Yugoslavia alone. Among them were Jews and non-Jews, conservatives and communists, Zionists and internationalists, resistance fighters and apoliticals. The flight along the Balkan route began in early 1933 with the first waves of persecution by the National Socialists. In 1938, the annexation of Austria and the November pogroms caused the stream of refugees to swell abruptly, as there were hardly any other routes left open. When Italy invaded the Kingdom of Greece at the end of October 1940 and Hitler planned his attack on the Balkan countries, this last escape route was suddenly closed. Thousands were trapped. In Greek mythology, the heroic odyssey ended happily for the hero – but for many of the Balkan refugees, it didn't.

A Biography

The man behind Hitler. The new biography about one of the most dazzling figures of the Nazi regime

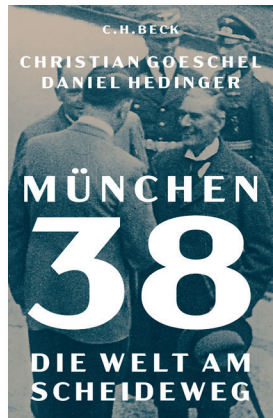
Hermann Göring (1893–1946), Reich Minister of Aviation and second in command behind Hitler, accumulated offices and powers like no other Nazi leader. In revealing scenes and analytically based on the latest research, this is the compelling biography of a ruthless man who seems to defy explanation. Göring's life is marked by a relentless pursuit of power and prestige, from his childhood to his conviction at the Nuremberg War Crimes Tribunal and his suicide in his prison cell. Göring's hunger for power is only limited by Adolf Hitler. He is devoted to him. After Göring fails as commander-in-chief of the air force in World War II and Hitler withdraws his favor, he retreats to his country estate Carinhall, where art theft, hunting, and decadent luxury are far more important than Allied bombing raids. His extravagant lifestyle has led to euphemistic interpretations of Göring's role in National Socialism. Andreas Molitor shows how the self-proclaimed 'man of action' sealed the economic and social decline of German Jews with the 'de-Jewification of the German economy' playing a leading role in the preparation of the Holocaust.

The World at a Crossroads

When the world stopped breathing: three days between war and peace

Munich 38 stands for appeasement towards aggressors. At the Munich Conference, Chamberlain and Daladier gave in to Hitler's threats and abandoned Czechoslovakia. Less than a year later, World War II began. Daniel Hedinger and Christian Goeschel tell the story of the dramatic three days when the world stood at a crossroads asking what the Munich Conference still has to tell us today. The events of that time are shockingly relevant even today. In the last days of September 1938, war was in the air. The conference in Munich, the capital of the Nazi movement, was a last-ditch, desperate attempt by France and Great Britain to save peace in Europe and thus the world. Since then, Munich has been a global place of remembrance. However, it has been viewed too much from a purely European perspective, overlooking the global background and impact of the conference. The rise of fascism had already challenged the existing world order. Only in this context could Hitler push ahead with his expansion. The rest of the world followed the events in Munich very closely and learned their lesson. Thus, the retreat before Hitler weakened the democratic defenses within and encouraged the aggressive powers to expand further—in Europe as well as in the rest of the world. Munich 1938 is a warning for our time.

or The Remains of a Life

The Story of my Great-Grandmother

Deep in the Sauerland region, 1887. A young woman makes her way up to the village of Cobbenrode where Anna Kalthoff is to become the new teacher, but she will not stay there for long. She soon rebels against the expectations of the village and the rules of her time. She decides for herself what she wants to do and how she wants to live, and whom she wants to love. And it will not be for her evil. Two centuries later, her traces have almost completely vanished. A few photos, poetry albums, postcards, a coffee set, an engagement ring: that was all Henning Sußebach had to start with when he set out to trace the footsteps of his great-grandmother Anna. After a year of searching, the picture became clear: a seemingly ordinary woman had led an extraordinary life, against all odds. Anna took from life what she wanted. Men, work, freedom! The author owes his life to her determination, and his groundbreaking book is an attempt to rescue a memory almost completely faded away. This book offers an enchanting approach to our ancestors, since without their initiative and their courage we would not be here today. And it encourages us to search for the Annas who exist in every family history.

Henning Sußebach, born in 1972, is editor of the weekly newspaper DIE ZEIT. He has been awarded some of the most important German journalism prizes for his reporting, including the German Reporter Prize, the Theodor Wolff Prize, the Henri Nannen Prize, and the Egon Erwin Kisch Prize.

A History of Taste

Ulrich Raulff writes the History of Taste

Everyone knows it exists. Everyone thinks they possess it. Yet no one has ever seen it: taste, our sense of beauty, our antenna for happiness and the tactile sense of our desires. Ulrich Raulff explores this ability to appreciate beauty, and he takes us on a materialistic journey through a vanity fair, a parade of likes from Meissen to Mac and from Diderot's dressing gown to Victoria's Secret. The trail leads to Winckelmann's Rome and Jefferson's Washington, to Paris around 1800, to Victorian England, and right up to our own time of Airbnb and food as an 'experience.'

Great tastemakers from Madame Pompadour to Steve Jobs welcome us as portal figures at the beginning of new taste eras. But the history of taste and its transformations is not just a history of aesthetic codes. It is also the story of a European invention, of raids, of the suffering of others and of our own historical guilt. And it is even more than that: it reveals an immense cultural achievement, a human capacity and a wealth of sensations helping us to perceive difference and transform it into culture.

Ulrich Raulff was the director of the German Literature Archive in Marbach from 2004 to 2018 and is president of the Institute for Foreign Cultural Relations from 2018 to 2025. In 2010, he received the Leipzig Book Award in the non-fiction/essay category for his book *Circle Without Master*, about the posthumous fame of Stefan George. His most recent book, *The Last Century of Horses*, was published by C.H.Beck in 2016. It was also shortlisted for the Leipzig Book Prize and has been translated into numerous languages.

The Third Reich and Literature – Helmuth Kiesel's masterful portrayal

The Nazi regime was an unprecedented challenge to German-language literature. Two and a half thousand authors, including the best, were forced to leave Germany. Those who remained and did not side with the Nazi regime were threatened with persecution. Helmuth Kiesel has written the first comprehensive account of this era covering a vast literary field he presents a moving, often harrowing picture of that time. In exile as in Germany, literary engagement with the present demanded existential strength, political clarity, and artistic talent. Helmuth Kiesel focuses on the literature of exile and inner emigration, on authors who were close to the regime, as well as on Austrian and Swiss German literature.

He presents the famous works of the era, from Anna Seghers' *The Seventh Cross* to Thomas Mann's *Doctor Faustus*, from Ernst Jünger's *The Marble Cliffs* to Hermann Hesse's *The Glass Bead Game* – alongside numerous remarkable forgotten works which are historically illuminating.

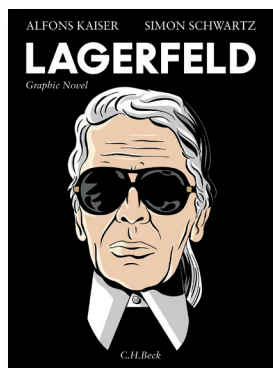
Many authors saw their main task in historically exploring the 'dark times' (Brecht) thus they were experiencing and bearing witness through literature. Helmuth Kiesel brings their voices to life with great diversity and an intensity never seen before.

Karl Lagerfeld's life as a Graphic Novel

Karl Lagerfeld stylishly presented himself as a living logo and a myth of the fashion world. But what was behind this larger-than-life, charismatic figure who, despite his love of communication, kept his own life story secret?

With his brilliant visual interpretation Simon Schwartz brings us closer to the man behind Lagerfeld: the precocious boy who preferred drawing in the attic to playing with his peers; the son who argued with his parents but never left their side; the sharp-tongued rival of Yves Saint Laurent, whom he ultimately outshone; the worldly genius in Paris who worked with Prussian discipline; and the partner of Jacques de Bascher, the great love of his life.

Alfons Kaiser is an editor at the newspaper F.A.Z. where he heads the 'Germany and the World' department. Karl Lagerfeld provided political caricatures for the monthly F.A.Z. magazine.

Simon Schwartz is one of Germany's best-known comic artists. He has made himself a name as the author of highly acclaimed and award-winning graphic novels and has been drawing the comic strip 'Vita Obscura' in F.A.Z. magazine since 2019, replacing Karl Lagerfeld's caricatures following his death.

The Age of the Horses

The History of Domestication from its Beginnings to the Equestrian Peoples

Retracing the Partnership between Humans and Horses

The domestication of the horse and its role as a source of food, riding, draught and working animal have shaped a key epoch in human history. Based on new archaeological, genetic and linguistic research, Harald Haarmann reconstructs the gradual process of taming and exploiting horses and shows how this partnership, which went on for thousands of years, changed not only horses but also humans.

The domestication of horses began in the steppes north of the Black Sea.

But why here of all places? And what connected humans and wild horses from the very beginning? Harald Haarmann describes how humans first followed horses as hunters, then as nomadic herders in search of green pastures. Between 8,000 and 9,000 years ago, the steppe nomads gradually became accustomed to consuming horse milk through genetic changes. Over 6,000 years ago, horses were first used as riding animals. After the invention of the wheel and cart, they enabled long migrations as draft animals. Chariot and cavalry armies brought about large-scale conquests. Domesticated horses spread to all continents and became power symbols in religion and politics.

Until the 20th century, horses were omnipresent in towns and countryside. The horse age came to an end with the industrial revolution, but thanks to their millennia-old influence, horses will continue to be partners, friends and helpers to humans in the future.

Harald Haarmann is one of the world's most renowned linguists and cultural scientists. He has been awarded the Prix Logos by the Association européenne des linguistes in Paris and the Premio Jean Monnet, among other honors. His books have been translated into many languages.

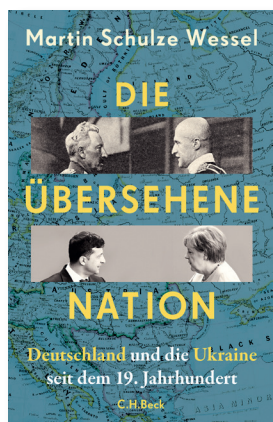

Guilt and Opportunity: The History of German-Ukrainian Relations

What does Ukraine have to do with us? Few would dispute that Germany bears historical responsibility towards Russia for the crimes of the Second World War. However, the fact that the same applies to Ukraine is much less firmly anchored in the public consciousness.

Martin Schulze Wessel recalls how closely German and Ukrainian history are intertwined in the 20th century, shows how historical experiences and perceptions continue to have an impact today, and asks what this means for our current relationship with Ukraine.

During the First World War, German colonial plans for Eastern Europe coincided with the aspirations of the Ukrainian national movement. The establishment of a Ukrainian nation state became viable in 1918 thanks to the German occupation of the country. This was one of the reasons why Stepan Bandera sought an alliance with Nazi Germany during the Second World War, but Hitler's colonial project differed fundamentally from that of imperial Germany. Ukraine became the center of Germany's war of extermination. After 1945, Ukraine disappeared again into the Soviet Union for a lot of people, and even after 1991 it remained a largely overlooked nation – with fatal consequences for the German response to Russia's war of aggression since 2014. Anyone who considers German-Ukrainian history, as Martin Schulze Wessel does, will find it difficult to remain indifferent to the fate of the country.

Martin Schulze Wessel is a Professor of Eastern and South-Eastern European History at the University of Munich and a member of the Bavarian Academy of Sciences and Humanities. From 2012 to 2016, he was President of the Association of German Historians. His book *Der Fluch des Imperiums* (The Curse of the Empire) was published by C.H.Beck.

What on earth is going on in the USA? Where does the poison in politics come from? The lying, denunciation and demonization, the hatred of minorities and the relentless persecution of the weak? How did white-hot anger become the norm in politics? Donald Trump and his MAGA movement have roots going back a long way into the 'American century'. This book uncovers them.

Bernd Greiner tells a different story of the USA over the last hundred years, depicting it as illuminating and depressing as well. It is the story of a society torn apart by internal wars, fueled by a middle-ground extremism that has proven to be the country's political metronome. At the center of this story are neither presidents nor parties but self-appointed guardians of the common good, citizens who, in the name of democracy, deny others democratic participation – with minimal tolerance for political dissent, uncompromising insistence on their own goals, and a missionary sense of purpose. They have broken the backbone of the labor movement, banished leftists from political life, marginalized critics of armament and war, and cemented white dominance. Above all else reigns the maxim that true power is based on the fear of others. And that uncertainty and fear earn greater profits. In other words, if Donald Trump were the only problem, America would have only a minor problem.

Bernd Greiner is founding director and member of the Berlin Centre for Cold War Studies. He taught non-European history at the University of Hamburg and headed the Theory and History of Violence department at the Hamburg Institute for Social Research until 2014.

Chancellor after the Catastrophe

The most recent Biography of Adenauer by Norbert Frei

Konrad Adenauer stands out among the chancellors of the Federal Republic of Germany. It was him to take over the reins of government of a defeated nation and to resolutely lead it into democracy and the West, after the Nazi dictatorship, World War II, and the Holocaust. He laid the foundations for a success story bringing prosperity and peace to West Germans for decades to come. But it was also Adenauer who accepted the division of Germany and enabled millions of perpetrators to remain silent about the crimes they had committed.

Above all, however, Frei analyzes Adenauer's policies after the German catastrophe: his unconditional alignment with the West, which he enforced against numerous obstacles and resistance, but also his serious failures in developing a democratic political culture. Frei presents us with a conservative Catholic, an autocratic party leader, an unscrupulous tactician, a far-sighted European, and a German who viewed his own people with great skepticism, even mistrust: one of the great political leaders of the 20th century.

Norbert Frei is a Professor Emeritus of Modern and Contemporary History at the University of Jena and author of various highly acclaimed publications on the German Past.

Poet of the Decameron, witness to a Time of Crisis: The Life of Giovanni Boccaccio

Giovanni Boccaccio is known as a pioneer of the Renaissance and world-famous for his Decameron, with its risqué erotic stories. However, his life is shrouded in mystery. Franziska Meier's brilliant biography depicts him as a restless contemporary of a crisis-ridden century. Pandemic, climate change, banking crisis, national debt, and the political shift to oligarchy: Giovanni Boccaccio (1313–1375) was a seismograph of all these upheavals in his time. Sensual and strict in his morals, conscious of tradition and forward-looking, he responded to the contradictions of a world in turmoil with his diverse work. Franziska Meier reconstructs his childhood and school days in Florence and the consequences of his illegitimate birth. We encounter him in Naples, the capital of King Robert of Anjou; in Florence, the proud, rich commune politically and economically in confusion; at the courts of ruthless autocrats in Romagna; and in the solitude of his retirement home in Certaldo. Above all, however, Franziska Meier portrays him as a brilliant storyteller and outstanding poet, as a friend of Petrarch and admirer of Dante, as a scholar and biographer whose work belongs to world literature.

Franziska Meier is a Professor of Romance literature and comparative literature at the University of Göttingen and a member of the Göttingen Academy of Sciences. She has published various books on classics.

Peter Stephan

The Invention of Prussia: A Biography

Frederick I (1657–1713) was long regarded as an unworldly aesthete who, out of a desire for pomp and splendor, proclaimed himself King of Prussia in 1701. Peter Stephan, on the other hand, describes 'Crooked Fritz' as the systematic inventor of the Prussian state symbolizing his understanding of himself and of state in art and architecture. This elegantly written biography is also a fascinating rediscovery of a forgotten Prussia. Even his father, the Great Elector, did not have much faith in his physically disabled, highly sensitive son, and posterity associated the Berlin Palace he built, a masterpiece of European Baroque architecture, primarily with the name of the architect Andreas Schlüter. For generations of historians, Prussian history began with his successor, the Soldier King Frederick William I. Peter Stephan thoroughly revises this image, a result of years of research. He describes how Frederick, as Elector of Brandenburg, systematically planned his coronation in Prussia, thereby linking the 'grand design' of a Prussian state based on tolerance, culture, and the rule of law. Stephan masterfully brings works of art such as the equestrian statue of the Great Elector and the Berlin Palace to life—as eloquent testimonies to the life and political ideology of the first and most misunderstood Prussian king.

Peter Stephan is a Professor of Art History and architectural theory. He is considered one of the leading experts on the Berlin Baroque era.

Ravenna, March 5, 493: 'There was not a bone left in that scoundrel.' This was how the Gothic king Theodoric commented on his murder of Odoacer, whom he had just sent to the other world with a single sword stroke. With the end of his adversary, a position had become vacant: a new ruler of the western part of the Roman Empire was needed. Anyone who had witnessed the bloody start of his reign could hardly expect Theodoric, of all people, to succeed in bringing Goths and Romans decades of peace and stability with his broken oaths and bloodstained hands.

This book tells the exciting story of how he managed to keep his two peoples apart through a clever division of labor—military tasks for the Goths, civil life and tax collection for the Romans. The secret of his success deciphered here, consisted in integration through separation! Even after 1,500 years, it is fascinating to see how Theodoric, despite the great potential for conflict – in matters of faith and church organization, between warriors and civilians, in relations with the emperor in Constantinople and the Germanic kings in the West, and in the face of pressing social problems – managed to maintain peace both internally and externally, but also to create peace without compromise when necessary.

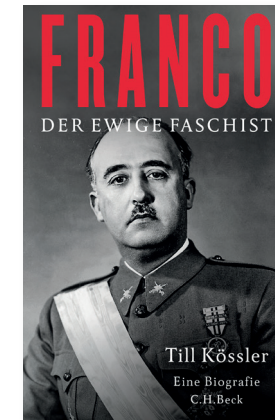

Francisco Franco is one of the most influential dictators of recent history. Unlike his allies Hitler and Mussolini, he managed to remain in power beyond the Second World War until 1975. In European contemporary history the classification of his person and his nearly 40-year of reign is still controversial today. As an essential account of Franco's life, this book provides insights into Spain's eventful history in the 20th century and offers at the same time starting points for a better understanding of authoritarian rule in our times.

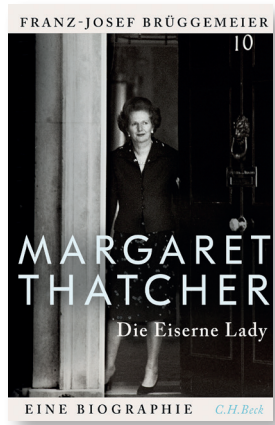
After 1945, Franco was considered by many to be an eternal fascist who no longer fits in with new democratic Europe. Yet he successfully served as a partner to the Western world and enjoyed considerable popularity among the Spanish population until his death in 1975. He cultivated his image as an efficient modernizer and sought advice from Western experts, but his rule was also based on the mass persecution of dissidents and was characterized by extreme social contrasts, widespread corruption and an economy of scarcity. Based on current research, this biography undertakes a historical reassessment of Franco. It vividly traces his career, drawing on primary sources: from his beginnings as a young colonial officer in Morocco to his rise as a cruel fascist autocrat in the Spanish Civil War and ally of the Axis powers in World War II, to the period of upheaval in the 1960s and 1970s.

Till Kössler is a Professor of Historical Education at the University of Halle-Wittenberg. His research focuses on the history of violence and overcoming violence, as well as the history of authoritarian regimes after 1945.

Margaret Thatcher (1925–2013) was one of the first female politicians to assert herself in a male-dominated world. 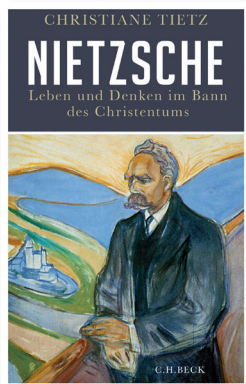

Nietzsche's hidden Christianity - a biographical search for traces

'God is dead! God remains dead! And we have killed him!' Nietzsche's most famous statement tempts us to see him as a radical atheist. Christiane Tietz, however, shows how deeply the pastor's son, who initially wanted to become a pastor himself, remained committed to theology. He valued Jesus as a 'free spirit.' His 'eternal recurrence of the same' is a reworking of the idea that the world is based on a divine plan. The language in *Zarathustra* is biblical. It is high time to rediscover the philosophical preacher in the context of theology. Nietzsche railed against Christian notions of sin and morality. On the other hand, he trumped Christian charity with 'love of strangers,' thought intensively about bearing the cross, and signed his last notes with 'The Crucified One.' Christiane Tietz vividly describes how Nietzsche was shaped in many ways by Protestantism in an evangelical parsonage, by a pietistic mother, at his boarding school and finally during his brief study of theology, before he took up the study of classical philology, admired Schopenhauer and Wagner, and philosophically transformed theology. She traces the theological currents of the time and shows how his thinking and language developed under the spell of Christianity. A fascinating search for traces of Nietzsche's unknown but highly vivid God.

Christiane Tietz has been President of the Protestant Church in Hesse and Nassau since 2025 and is an honorary Professor at the University of Mainz. She was previously a Professor of Systematic Theology at the University of Zurich and lived in Zurich and Sils Maria. Heinrich August Winkler is one of Germany's most important contemporary historians. He is also one of the country's most influential intellectuals, still shaping political debate in Germany. In his new book he recalls his life journey from Königsberg to southern Germany and Berlin, his encounters and experiences, conversations and controversies, mistakes and insights. Winkler looks back on his childhood in Königsberg and the final weeks of the Third Reich he experienced in Württemberg. He recounts his formative experiences in the post-war period, his academic and political role models, his early encounters with Konrad Adenauer and Willy Brandt, and the struggle to westernize the Federal Republic. He recalls the partitioning of Germany and how it was overcome, the founding of the Berlin Republic and his interventions in political disputes of the time, right up to his criticism of the SPD's Ostpolitik and his early warnings about Putin. He describes his return to Königsberg and conversations with Gerhard Schröder, Wolfgang Schäuble, Jürgen Habermas, Ralf Dahrendorf and many others. But Winkler's book is not a memoir in the classic sense. It is a chronicle of a life dedicated to the historical and political self-enlightenment of the Germans. These memoirs offer something more essential today than ever before: a political and moral compass in the current altering times.

Heinrich August Winkler, born in Königsberg in 1938, is one of Germany's most prominent historians. He taught contemporary history at Berlin University from 1991 to 2007. In 2014, he received the Hans Ringier Foundation's Europa Prize for Political Culture and in 2016 the Leipzig Book Prize for European Understanding. In 2018, the Federal President awarded him the Grand Cross of Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany. Various publications.

A moving Memoir about Life in Politics and Living with Anxiety

Michael Roth writes about the 'zones of fear' in professional politics. About internal party power struggles, social media and the threat of a shitstorm. About being pilloried for questioning the rituals and language of one's own bubble, party or peer group. About the false political game of playing on societal fear. Michael Roth has suffered from this fear more and more. Nevertheless, he only recognized his own mental illness very late. With his book, he wants to encourage others to face their own fears sparing neither his political companions nor himself. Michael Roth was a professional politician for almost half his life, most recently he was a chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee in the Bundestag.

As a passionate supporter of Ukraine, he re-evaluated his view of Russia. He therefore found himself under fire not only within his own party. Roth grew up in difficult circumstances in the 'border zone' of northern Hesse. At the age of 28, he entered the Bundestag. He experienced the first red-green coalition in the federal government, the years of the grand coalition and, finally, the abruptly failed experiment of the traffic light coalition. After almost 27 years as a directly elected member of parliament suffering from mental illness, he decided to end his political career. With this book he presents a very personal account of his life in politics and his fears: radically candid, analytically clear and harshly self-critical.

Michael Roth, born in 1970, was a directly elected SPD member of the German Bundestag for almost three decades. From 2009 to 2013, he was European policy spokesman for his parliamentary group and general secretary of the Hessian SPD, and from 2013 to 2021 he was Minister of State for Europe at the Federal Foreign Office. As chairman of the Bundestag's Foreign Affairs Committee, he has been one of the most resolute supporters of Ukraine since the beginning of Russia's war of annihilation. This has made him just as well known to the public as his advocacy for Israel and Jewish life. After the last federal election, Roth decided to leave politics, having made his mental illness public two years earlier.

There is a time in life when farewells become more frequent: farewells to dreams, certainties and friends – and above all to those people who have shaped us and accompanied us for the longest time, our parents. In this very personal book, Klaus Brinkbäumer describes his seven years of farewells. Many of us have gone through this phase of life, are currently experiencing it, or are about to experience it. The feeling of life's stability is fading. Our elderly parents are becoming ill or suffering from dementia, they move into care homes, become lonely, suffering, and dying. The generation of sons and daughters, now in their fifties and sixties, feel a sense of duty but are unsure how to fulfil it. Our own children leave home and go their own ways. Friendships end without explanation, the political world, our society are changing rapidly, and the profession in which we have been successful and at home for decades collapses.

Klaus Brinkbäumer explores this rupture in his life with great honesty, these seven years of grief and loss in which he must let go. He allows himself intense feelings previously unheard of. And he experiences the happiness of two children, who move to New York and back, and final conversations with his parents – a chance to let go and find himself again.

Klaus Brinkbäumer was editor-in-chief and contributor of SPIEGEL magazine. He won the Egon Erwin Kisch Prize and the Henri Nannen Prize, among others. Between 2021 and 2024, he was program director at MDR, and today he works as a presenter, author, filmmaker and columnist. Various publications and bestsellers.

Autocrats such as China and Russia, Iran and even Turkey – employ a big variety of strategies to systematically undermine Western democracies. Their new form of silent and covert but effective hybrid warfare has long since reached the Federal Republic of Germany. Following their SPIEGEL bestseller Die Moskau-Connection (The Moscow Connection), FAZ journalists Reinhard Bingener and Markus Wehner trace the threatening axis of autocratic states attacking Germany and the ways they menace our society and institutions. They conclude that politicians, authorities and most citizens in this country have been far too naive for far too long.

The autocrats always had and continue to have an easy time weakening us. They assign a new type of agent in our states, order murders and take advantage of the vulnerability of our critical infrastructure for acts of sabotage. They corrupt decision-makers, support extremist parties or groups and abuse refugee flows as a weapon. They spread questionable narratives via foreign media, influence portals and trolls, spreading doubt regarding our democracy. And they carry out cyber attacks on state institutions. In this 'turning point,' the West is increasingly threatened by a covert war. Thus it is essential to us to find resilience and enlightenment to fight the threats. The authors show how we in Germany and Europe are trying to resist showing us the alterations necessary to protect ourselves more effectively in the future. One thing is certain: we will need persistence in this decisive struggle.

Life in Superdiversity

Integration in the Age of Super-Diverse Societies

Never before in human history have so many people from such diverse regions of the world lived together so closely in large cities as they do today. This 'superdiversity' is increasingly changing our neighborhoods: the old majority is ceasing to be the majority and is becoming a minority among other minorities. But how do immigrants deal with this situation?

In their groundbreaking study, Maurice Crul and Frans Lelie come to some surprising conclusions:

It does not really matter if people have a positive or negative view of diversity and migration, they all have long been participating in shared practices of living together in a super-diverse environment. The current debates on migration and diversity are not exactly optimistic.

There are frequent appeals to control or even stop immigration to protect society from overly negative changes. However, the reality of urban life in Hamburg or Vienna, in Offenbach or Sindelfingen shows that superdiversity is here to stay. Maurice Crul and Frans Lelie's research clarifies that this new reality is not necessarily a loss for people of German descent.

The separation line does not run between people with and without a migrant background. For all of us, it is much more a matter of how to participate actively in our super-diverse society.

Maurice Crul is a Professor of Sociology at the University of Amsterdam and holds the Chair in Education and Diversity. For 30 years, he has been working on issues of integration and diversity in Europe and North America. He heads the EU-funded project *Becoming a Minority*, which examines the experiences of people without a migration background who live in neighbourhoods where the majority of the population belongs to minorities.

Frans Lelie is a research fellow at the Institute for Sociology at the University of Amsterdam. She has worked extensively with women with a migrant background and their families. She developed the project *Becoming a Minority* together with Maurice Crul.

Oat milk, electric cars, heat pumps and holidays on your doorstep have become symbols of an ecological and therefore better way of life. When it comes to climate change, many seem to agree: we all have a duty to significantly reduce our individual greenhouse gas consumption. In her thought-provoking essay, Frauke Rostalski challenges this narrative and says: There is currently no obligation to reduce CO₂ emissions.

National and individual heroic deeds come to nothing or, in the worst case, even prove counterproductive as long as there is no effective system at the international level to integrate them.

Legal and ethical obligations are always linked to the suitability of the measures required to achieve the desired goal. The harsh truth, however, is that climate change is a global problem which can only be effectively solved at the global level. It is primarily the responsibility of politicians to work towards an effective global concept for combating climate change.

In the meantime, we need to cool down our climate debate, in which pressure to take sides and emotional accusations are creating a wall of resentment hindering objective discussion.

Everyone should realize that climate protection is not a question of attitude or powerful symbols. Rather, it requires targeted action instead of exhibiting moral superiority over others.

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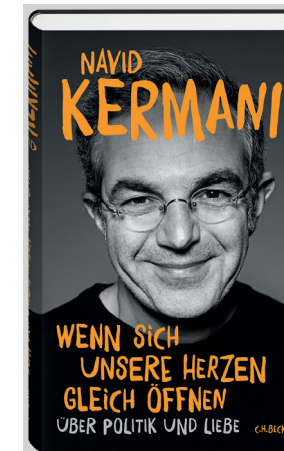

The East, the West and Democracy at Risk

Ilko-Sascha Kowalczyk is one of the foremost experts on the history of the GDR and one of the most prominent observers of the reunification process. The FAZ newspaper called him the ‘punk among German historians.’ Bodo Ramelow has been politically active in eastern Germany since 1990 and was Minister-President of Thuringia from 2014 to 2024. The two have come together to examine the causes of the AfD’s sweeping election victory in the new federal states and to discuss the prospects for our democracy. The contemporary historian and the politician do not mince their words and arrive at a very nuanced picture of the present state of German-German relations.

Much of what went wrong in the East after 1990 can be explained by omissions and mistakes in the reunification process. Other factors stem from exaggerated expectations and a misunderstanding of freedom and personal responsibility. As a result, a toxic atmosphere is affecting ever larger sections of the population – not only in the East, but also in the West. In a very intense conversation, Kowalczyk and Ramelow discuss this process and its disastrous effects on our democracy. Anyone should read this book to understand how the ‘new wall’ emerged running not only along the former German-German border but also between the defenders of democracy and those deliberately or recklessly threatening it.

Ilko-Sascha Kowalczyk is a historian and journalist as well as a scientific advisor to the management of the DDR Museum in Berlin. He is one of Germany’s most renowned experts on the history of the GDR and communism. Various bestselling publications.

The Turmoil of Class Society – and what can be done about it

Those up there, us down here – this catchy phrase expresses the fundamental sentiment of a new class society in which solidarity seems to be a foreign concept. Sociologist Nicole Mayer-Ahuja shows how work is changing in contemporary capitalism, how divisions between wage earners are deepening – and where there is potential to overcome differences and competition and stand up for common interests. Mayer-Ahuja describes the deepening divide between labor and capital, but also between different groups of employees. Their working and living conditions have become so polarized that some wage earners are secured at the expense of others: permanent staff are separated from marginalized workers within companies, precarious domestic workers compensate for the flexible working hours of 'highly qualified' workers, women and migrant workers are disproportionately employed in the low-wage sector, etc.

With a focus on precarious jobs and skilled permanent positions, on industry and services, the book analysis the experiences different groups of workers have in common.

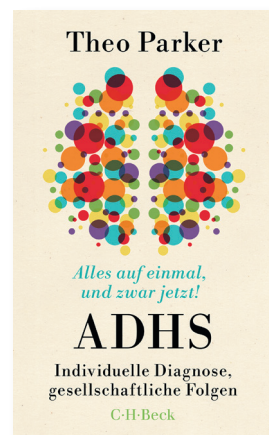

People with ADHD function differently. Their perception, stimulus processing and even the way their brains work obey their own rules – or so it is often said. But is that true? Theo Parker is a psychologist diagnosed with ADHD himself since over ten years. He takes a nuanced approach to the phenomenon, uncovering surprising insights and raising some uncomfortable questions. The number of ADHD diagnoses has doubled in the last 15 years. Appointments at specialist clinics often involve years of waiting, while self-diagnoses are shared and encouraged on social media. So, is ADHD a long-neglected neurological development disorder or just a hype diagnosis and symptom of our time? As a psychologist affected by ADHD, Theo Parker discusses the question against the backdrop of his knowledge and his own experiences. He provides clear and well-founded explanations on the topics of diagnosis and medication, while also taking the social context into account. How much does ADHD have to do with personal idiosyncrasies – and how much with the mechanisms of our performance-oriented society? This book brings clarity to the current debate and discusses what really helps when everything is happening all at once in your head.

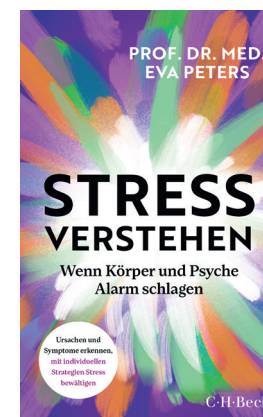
When your Body and Mind sound the Alarm

What happens to us when everything is too much

Everyone knows it, almost everyone has it – and most of us have too much of it: stress. Apart from the fact that we experience it very realistically in our own bodies and feel its effects deep in our souls, stress is a concept. But what exactly does it describe? How does it work? What reactions does stress trigger in our bodies? How much stress is good? And when does it make us ill? Although we all feel constantly stressed, we only have a vague idea of what is going on within us. We notice its symptoms, but we don't really understand what it does to us, and even less how we can help ourselves. Often, the true causes are not apparent at first glance.

Eva Peters has been studying the processes taking place in our bodies when we experience stress for many years. Not all of us are stressed by the same things, and men experience stress differently than women because of their different bodies. When stress becomes chronic it ends up being critical to our health having a negative impact on our mental and physical well-being throwing our nervous, hormonal and immune systems out of balance. Once we understand what stress really is, we can better address its causes and develop individual strategies for coping with it.

Prof. Dr. med. Eva Peters is a Professor of Psychoneuroimmunology and a specialist in psychosomatic medicine and dermatology and venereology. She also heads the Laboratory for Psychoneuroimmunology at the University Medical Centre in Giessen. In her stress consultation hours at the Charité hospital in Berlin, she has treated patients suffering from stress-related illnesses for many years.

In *Blind Ghosts*, Lina Schwenk tells a touching family story from the 1950s to the present day. In her haunting debut novel, she explores a period when urgent questions collide with profound silence.

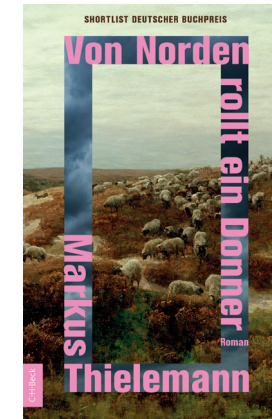

Where it is primarily about wolf politics, he soon encounters hatred, nationalist ideology – and a profound silence. *A Thunder Rolling In From The North* is a search for clues in the West German provinces, the story of a fragile 'original German' idyll.

Markus Thielemann, born in 1992, lives in Hanover. He studied geography and philosophy in Osnabrück, then literary writing in Hildesheim. *Von Norden rollt ein Donner* is his second novel and was shortlisted for the German Book Prize in 2024.

Established in 1979 by Günter Grass and awarded every two years for an unfinished prose manuscript, the prize is organized by the Academy of Arts and the Literary Colloquium Berlin and, in the spirit of its founder, commemorates Döblin as one of the most versatile writers of modern times. The Alfred Döblin Prize will be awarded for the 25th time this year and is endowed with 15,000 euros.

Swiss Book Prize 2024 for Zora del Buono for her novel *Seinetwegen*

Seinetwegen by Zora del Buono has been awarded the Swiss Book Prize 2024. The jury's statement reads:

Zora del Buono has written a text that affects everyone, even though it deals with the death of her father. He died in a car accident when she was eight months old. Sixty years later, the author sets out to find his 'killer.' With surprising ease, she interweaves statistics, court documents, and scenes from her life in this densely composed research novel. In her own unique language, del Buono explores the questions of guilt, loss, and reconciliation. 'Seinetwegen' is a quiet, unpretentious text full of existential power.

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
